ODYSSEY '84

Tim Price's new play was a powerful, epic re-telling of the 1984 Miners' Strike, which drew its inspiration from Ancient Greek poet Homer's epic poem, *The Odyssey*. Just as Odysseus' journey home from the Trojan War took 20 years, while his wife Penelope waited at home, miner turned NUM fundraiser, John O'Donnell completed an epic adventure that took him across the globe, whilst his wife Penny stayed at home, supporting other families, understanding the real value of community impact and completing her own journey to political awakening.

Sherman Theatre's Artistic Director, Joe Murphy, directed a passionate and heartfelt production, at times incredibly moving but with comedic scenes, too, providing some light-hearted relief. The production was a spectacular theatre experience marking the 40th anniversary of one of the most tumultuous chapters in recent Welsh history. Featuring a soundtrack of fantastic and nostalgie 80s tunes, and a dramatic set, which you can see the build of in our photo timeline below, the production shone a light on the role women played in the stand-off with the British government as well as the international support the miners received.



WORK OFF OUR STAGES

Each Made at Sherman production is an opportunity to widen access and promote participation, to work with schools and communities, and to offer training and development opportunities for new and emerging artists and theatre-makers. The additional activity undertaken across the company to support *Odyssey '84* provides some examples of the real team effort that goes into making theatre.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

On the 26th of June we presented a script in hand reading of *Odyssey '84* at Big Pit National Coal Museum to an invited audience of 50 ex-miners and their families, including participants who have been working with our Creative Engagement team during the research stages of the production. A second reading took place at the Sherman on the 27th June as part of our *Tales & Tea* initiative. Both were extended performances (2 hours 30 minutes), with a cast of nine actors.

Through *Tales & Tea* we provide a daytime performance for audience members who prefer not to venture out to the theatre in the evening. The project aims to promote wellbeing through the opportunity to see a brand new piece of writing, share thoughts and feedback, chat and meet others in a supported, friendly environment. Each performance is comprised of a rehearsed reading in either the Sherman Studio or Main House theatre, a post show Q&A session with the writer, director, and cast, followed by tea, cake and an opportunity to socialise.

The audience age ranges from 50 to 80+. Performances are held on a quarterly basis, both at Sherman Theatre and, where possible, in community venues. All performances have BSL interpretation and are relaxed, Dementia Friendly performances.

SCHOOLS' ENGAGEMENT

We offered schools and colleges a number of ways to creatively engage with the production, providing a unique way for learners to explore contemporary Welsh history and a pivotal moment in global politics and economics, with the choice of three different workshops available for students in Year 10 and above. The workshops took place at the theatre, prior to performances.

Workshop 1 - Art and Protest

This workshop was linked to several curriculum subjects including Art, Drama, English, Media Studies, History and Government and Politics. We looked at how art has been an integral tool in political protest over centuries, giving learners the opportunity to discover the characteristics, impact and history of Protest Art, consider how Protest Art featured in the miners' strike as well as enabling them to create their own piece of Protest Art.

Workshop 2 - Media and the Miners

This workshop was linked with curriculum subjects including English, Media Studies, History and Government and Politics, and looked at the role of the media in covering the strike and how reporting impacted public sympathy for the miners, or support for the government. Giving learners the opportunity to discover more about the media's coverage during the miners' strike and the role it played in manipulating public opinion; consider the impact that social media would have had on events, had they happened today and looking at the strike in relation to contemporary political movements, as well as giving them the chance to create their own news reports of key events from the strike.

Workshop 3 – Epic Storytelling

Our final workshop explored the features of Epic storytelling and why it is an effective form, across literature, poetry and drama, which enabled it to link with curriculum subjects including English, Drama, Classics and History. We gave students the chance to discover more about the characteristics of Epic storytelling; consider the impact of using epic devices to elevate contemporary stories, through the context of *Odyssey* '84 and create their own piece of Epic storytelling.

ARTIST DEVELOPMENT

As well as the cast of professional actors, *Odyssey '84* featured ensemble support from members of the Sherman Players, Sherman Theatre's non-professional group for ages 18+. The Sherman Players meet on a weekly basis to learn about theatre making through designing, scriptwriting and acting. Each year members have the opportunity to be part of a full production with a professional director and, where appropriate, have the opportunity to gain experience as part of the ensemble for Made at Sherman productions.

AUDIENCE DEVELOPMENT

Work with Big Pit National Coal Museum during the development stages of the project, alongside running engagement activities with a number of local community groups, helped us to forge new relationships. These relationships continued to develop through the production run, resulting in a number of audiences from across the South Wales Valleys and Swansea Valleys attending performances. We also successfully attracted new audiences to the Sherman, with 35% of the *Odyssey '84* audience visiting the Sherman for the first time.

In the Sherman foyer we installed a food collection point, working in partnership with the Cardiff Food Bank. This will now remain in situ as a permanent place for our audiences to donate when visiting the theatre.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Our Literary team liaised with the Archives team at Swansea University to read committee minutes and look at photographs from South Wales NUM archives. The team found interesting details, that they were able to feed back to writer Tim Price, adding texture and ideas into the production text. Our Creative Engagement manager liaised with The South Wales Miners' Library who lent Sherman Theatre the beautiful banners that adorned the foyer during the performance period.

What is your favourite Sherman Theatre production and why?

Housemates, as I got to do the lighting design for it, and it was a wonderful experience to work on such an amazing show. The story was so important and the audience reaction was amazing, I was in tears every night. It was so moving and uplifting.

What has been your busiest day with Sherman Theatre since you've been working there?

There have been so many busy days it's hard to pick one! Probably a festival day like National Theatre Connections when we have multiple Youth Theatre groups who will tech and perform their shows one after the other throughout the day. As a production team we will help each group to fit up their set and props, focus and plot lighting and sound, and then do a cue to cue of their show, before they perform to the other groups. We then take it down and start the next one. This is normally a busy weekend as the festival lasts three days, with multiple groups, including Sherman Youth Theatre, performing.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

No two days are the same, there is always something exciting happening. My favourite

moments are usually in the technical rehearsals for our Made at Sherman shows, when everything comes together and you get to see what the whole show will look and sound like for the first time.

How do you prepare for a day at Sherman Theatre?

I always have breakfast to give me the energy I need for the morning, and make a cup of tea, which I bring in with me. When I arrive, I'll pick up my radio and generally go straight to the theatre to switch on the lighting and sound for whatever show is on. I tend to do this before everyone else is due to start so I am ready to go.

How do you relax after a day at work?

If I finish early enough, I will take our dog Ziggy for a walk in the park or around the neighbourhood. Then, I usually relax in front of the TV with either a quiz show like QI or a crime drama.

What are you most looking forward to in Sherman Theatre's calendar?

A Christmas Carol, which we are in fit up for now. As it's the second time we've done the show it is all going very smoothly. I'm looking forward to seeing how the new cast members have fitted in and what is the same, but different, this time around.



SPOTLIGHT ON SPRING 2025 – THE WOMEN OF LLANRUMNEY RETURNS

Azuka Oforka's debut play *The Women of Llanrumney* returns for a second run from 26 April to 10 May 2025. A devastating historical drama, *The Women of Llanrumney*, is set on the Llanrumney sugar plantation in 18th century colonialised Jamaica, and explores the experiences of women during slavery through the story of Annie and her daughter, Cerys.

It was commissioned by Sherman Theatre and made its debut in a run of sold-out performances in May 2024, which were received with critical-acclaim by audiences and critics alike.

If you haven't already seen it, or even if you have, with Azuka Oforka recently winning the prestigious Best Writer Award at the Stage Debut Awards 2024 for this play, it is a production not to be missed. Prior to returning to the Sherman, *The Women of Llanrumney* will transfer to Stratford East in London, from 19 March to 12 April 2025.

What began as a project exploring the impact of the sudden arrival of a Banksy original in the town became, over six years, an evolving portrait of a community and a testament to its resilience. Now, the stories of the community take centre stage, their words performed live by a professional east.
